Jamia's petition to get salary for teacher from UGC rejected by Delhi High Court

The Delhi High Court has dismissed a petition by Jamia Millia Islamia to get money from the University Grants Commission (UGC). The varsity had petitioned the court to direct the UGC to release funds for the Sarojini Naidu Centre for Women Studies. Jamia moved the application saying that the professor's salary could not be paid due to the non-grant of aid under the regular budget or under the scheme of 'Development of Women Studies in Indian Universities' by the UGC and sought to direct the commission to release the grant to the centre and to clear the deficit balance of Rs 6 crore under the scheme, according to a report by PTI.

Single-teacher schools will no longer be allowed, says AP Education Minister

Andhra Pradesh's Education Minister Botcha Satyanarayana has made it clear that not even a single school in the state was closed and there were no such intentions from the government. Addressing a press conference from the state's party office in Guntur district's Tadepalle town on Thursday, July 7, Satyanarayana said that after independence, the YSRCP ruling government has brought reforms in the education sector in the country in accordance with the new education system.

According to a report by The New Indian Express, Satyanarayana said, "We are trying to educate everyone. Chief Minister YS Jaganmohan Reddy is working hard to provide the best education from the school level. The 'Amma Vodi' scheme was introduced to reduce dropouts and make it easier for children to go to school."

There are 42,750 schools in Andhra Pradesh. Satyanarayana pointed out that the government is setting up foundation schools according to the new education system and making changes in Anganwadis to that effect. Decisions are also being taken to improve standards of education from Grade I, he added. The Education Minister also informed that Chief Minister YS Jagan Mohan Reddy has said that schools should be available to all within a one-kilometre radius and that facilities should be developed to ensure that, including merging of schools wherever necessary. Only 5,250 schools have been mapped, according to the report by TNIE.

"It has come to our attention that 296 schools are located at a distance of more than a kilometre. We will definitely reconsider if students are troubled by it and will make changes accordingly," Satyanarayana said.

More than 1 billion students 'unable to learn' because of the pandemic: UN reports

According to data released by the United Nations (UN), almost 91% of students worldwide were unable to learn because of school closures during the COVID-19 pandemic in the last two years. That amounts to 1.6 billion children around the world. School closures during the pandemic also put in peril 396 million children who relied on meals provided in schools for their nutritional needs.

CCTV cameras proposed for Delhi schools again? Parents say it violates right to privacy

Despite opposition from parents and teachers groups, the Delhi government will soon install CCTV cameras in schools, mainly government schools, and the live footage from classrooms will be shared with parents.

The Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) had earlier, in 2019, issued a circular stating that they would install CCTV cameras in all government schools and provide live feed of the classrooms to the parents. However, the Delhi Parents of Association and the Government School Teachers' Association had filed a petition in the Delhi High Court regarding the same and sought for the immediate removal of CCTVs inside classrooms and destruction of the footage.



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Tussle among Delhi University teachers over workload of English lecturers



English lecturers at Delhi University (DU) have written to the President of the DU Teachers Association (DUTA), seeking intervention on the possible loss of workload following the implementation of the Undergraduate Curriculum Framework (UGCF) which is to be implemented from the academic year 2022-23.

In a letter signed by more than 450 English teachers at various colleges in DU, the DUTA has been asked to ensure the restoration of English as an Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) course, and as a core language course in the BA and BCom degrees.

The UGCF drops English from the AEC course, and states that it will only be offered in languages mentioned in the Eighth Schedule of the Indian Constitution, which only includes Indian languages. It also removes the hitherto compulsory core language English course from the BA and BC om degrees.

The teachers have pointed out that this will lead to the reduction of one-third of their workload, and will, therefore, cause a loss of livelihood. "With the removal of English as an option in AEC, English departments across the University are staring at a drastic reduction of workload. Colleges like Kirori Mal and Ramjas have lost 60+ lectures while Hansraj, Shaheed Bhagat Singh (M) and others have lost more than 50 lectures next semester. Hence this decision threatens the livelihood of all the adhoc teachers working in the English departments across the University," states the letter.

Has immunity of students taken a beating after staying home for two years due to COVID? Experts weigh in

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After the reopening of schools a month ago, the number of children falling sick seems to be on the rise. TNIE checked multiple schools in Chennai on Tuesday, July 5, and found that at least three to four kids were sick in each classroom, particularly in Classes I to V.

While there is a modicum of compliance in wearing of masks in schools, social distancing is seldom followed. School authorities cite lack of space in institutions as the reason.

"With COVID cases on the rise, parents and teachers are worried. Health experts told us it is mostly seasonal flu because of rains. But the health department could organise special fever camps outside schools where the incidence of fever is high. They did a similar drive for fever cases in residential complexes earlier," said P Patrick Raymond, General Secretary, Tamil Nadu Graduate Teachers Federation.

Some experts recommended staggered break timings in schools.

"It is impossible to stop kids from sharing their food or interacting with one other during lunch breaks. Also, it has been a few years since students came to school and their excitement to be together is understandable. So, there can be different break timings for each class," said K Priyanka, an education rights activist.

According to health experts, children develop immunity to various viruses and bacteria by regular exposure to a small inoculum of microorganisms at their schools and through their playmates. But their immunity has taken a toll now as most of the children had to stay at home for at least two years.

"Balanced diet and enough hydration hold the key to addressing the current situation. While getting infected with viruses and bacteria impacts a child's immunity, not getting infected at all for a long time may have consequences too. However, parents need not be worried about COVID as it is not very virulent among children," said Dr Kamala Nathan, a consultant paediatrician.

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
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Navya Annual Fest 2k22



World Environment Day, 2022


